comprehensive plan to train nurses and rural health care workers to prevent and treat cervical cancer and to implement a sustainable system of referrals in seven regions of Guatemala.

More than two dozen hospitals in Honduras received personal protective equipment for their medical staff thanks to a \$169,347 global grant sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Villa Real de Tegucigalpa, Honduras, and Waldo Brookside-Kansas City, Missouri.

The Rotary clubs of Cotonou Le Nautile, Benin, and Tournai Haut-Escaut, Belgium, received a \$39,390 global grant to provide agricultural training at an ecologically responsible permaculture mini-farm connected to a center for children in Sowé, Benin. This will help a new generation of farmers become economically self-sufficient.

I like comparing The Rotary Foundation to the Taj Mahal, a monument of one man's love for a woman. The Foundation is a dynamic monument of our love for all of humanity.

This month I am asking all Rotary clubs to bring attention to the Foundation. It is what connects all Rotarians worldwide and transforms our collective passions into projects that change lives. WORD ORIGINS

Ringleader. What is the reason the leader of a group of people is called a “ringleader”? The term comes from dancing. Many old dances began with all the participants holding hands in a ring. Then the circle was broken and one person led the rest of the “ring” through the figures of the dance.

Rival. What is the derivation of the word “rival”? It comes from the Latin word for “stream” – rivus. The original “rivals” were people who lived an opposite side of a stream and fought bitterly over which side of the stream was the better to live on. Many such communities still do.

Scapegoat. Why is a person who suffers for another’s deeds called a “scapegoat”? The Book of Leviticus in the Bible tells how on the Day of Atonement the sins of the people were symbolically placed upon the head of a goat and the “goat” was then allowed to “escape” into the wilderness. Thus the term “scapegoat” literally means “escaping goat.”

Spendthrift. What is the origin of the word “spendthrift”? A “Spendthrift” is one who “spends” the “thrift” – that is, the “savings” - of another. The term was first applied to the young man who upon inheriting his father’s fortune immediately spent it.

Sucker. How did a gullible person come to be called a “sucker”? A rather stupid fish is called a “sucker” – because it “sucks up” its food. It will just complacently suck in live food, garbage, or a

worm dangled in front of it on a hook. A person who, like the fish, complacently swallow the bait is also a “sucker.”

Thug. Why are criminals sometimes called “thugs”? The original “thugs” were members of a professional gang of thieves and murderers in India who made a practice of strangling their victims. The word is from the Hindustani *thag*, meaning a “cheat” or “swindler.”

Turncoat. Why is a traitor called a “turncoat”? In allusion to a literal turning of the coat inside out that was the custom in the days when feudal lords maintained their own armies. Each lord had a special livery for his servants and swordsmen and when a man left one lord for the services of another, he turned his livery coat inside out so that he might not be mistaken for an enemy upon approaching the castle of his new master.

Tycoon. How did a person of importance come to be called a “tycoon”? The word comes from the Japanese *tai*, meaning “great,” and *kun*, meaning “prince.” The Japanese have never used the word among themselves, however; they use it only when speaking to foreigners in an attempt to impress them with their own importance and the sovereignty of their ruler. Commodore Perry brought the word back from Japan with him in 1854.

Umpire. Where does the word “umpire” come from? From the old French word *nompair*, meaning “not paired.” The “umpire” is the third or “not paired” person called upon to decide between two contestants.

Vamp. Why are seductive women called “vamps”? A seductive woman is called a “vamp” in allusion to the “vampire” of folk lore – a ghostly being that supposedly sucked the blood of a living person.

Vandal. What is the reason a person who needlessly destroys property is called a “vandal”? The term gets its meaning from a Teutonic tribe. In 455 A.D., Genseric and his “Vandal” hordes captured Rome and mutilated the public monuments of the city without regard to their worth or beauty.

Villain. How did a “villain” come to be called that? In feudal times, this term meant “one attached to the villa” – that is, “the manor house.” The notion of wickedness grew out of the assumption on the part of the feudal lord of the manor that all servants were knaves.

***DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS
IN
BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS***

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

1. Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
2. Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
3. Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
4. Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
5. Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
7. Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or professions;
8. Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

ROTARY CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will

1. Exemplify the core value of integrity in all behaviors and activities
2. Use my vocational experience and talents to serve in Rotary
3. Conduct all of my personal, business, and professional affairs ethically, encouraging and fostering high ethical standards as an example to others
4. Be fair in all dealings with others and treat them with the respect due to them as fellow human beings
5. Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community
7. Honor the trust that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do anything that will bring dis-favor or reflect adversely on Rotary or fellow Rotarians
8. Not seek from a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship
