RI PRESIDENT-ELECT ANNOUNCES 2022 – 2023 PRESIDENTIAL THEME

Rotary International President-elect Jennifer Jones wants members to imagine the possibilities in the change they can make to transform the world.

Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, revealed the 2022-23 presidential theme, Imagine Rotary, as she urged people to dream big and harness their connections and the power of Rotary to turn those dreams into reality.

“Imagine, a world that deserves our best,” Jones told incoming district governors on 20 January, “where we get up each day knowing that we can make a difference.”

Jones, who will make history on 1 July by becoming Rotary’s first female president, gave a live online address to precede Rotary’s annual training event for district governors from around the world, the International Assembly. The assembly was rescheduled because of the COVID-19 pandemic and will now be held virtually 7-14 February.

Jones told the incoming governors about a chance she took when a member asked for assistance in getting a young peace activist out of Afghanistan during the U.S. troop withdrawal last year. At first unsure how she could help, she relied on “that certain Rotary magic” and contacted a former Rotary Peace Fellow she had met a

few years earlier. Less than 24 hours later, the activist was on an evacuation list, and soon she was on her way to Europe.

Engaging members through meaningful responsibility

To better engage members, Rotary needs to “adapt and retool,” Jones said, using her hometown as an example. Windsor was once the automotive hub of Canada. But after plant closings left thousands without work, the city needed to retool, in the same way an auto plant would, preparing for new parts or a new model. Now, Jones said, Windsor is a leader in agribusiness and medical and aerospace technology.

For Rotary, “finding the right ‘part’ to engage each member should be our core function,” Jones said. “It comes down to the comfort and care of our members.”

Engaging members is crucial to retaining members, she said, adding that we need to ask members what they want to get from Rotary and give them meaningful responsibilities.

“It is our offer of hands-on service, personal growth, leadership development, and lifelong friendships that creates purpose and passion,” Jones said.

Embracing change also means embracing new club models, Jones said, as she asked the incoming governors to form at least two new innovative or cause-based clubs during their term. “Let’s make sure we engage our members so they love their clubs and their Rotary experience,” she added.

Jones also announced the appointment of a Rotaract member as a Rotary public image coordinator and said that she has included

Rotaractors on several committees and will assign some Rotaractors as president's representatives.

"We have been entrusted with leadership in our great organization," Jones said. "Now it is up to us to be brave and intentional in our actions, and let others help us lead."

Jones noted that Rotary has little time left to achieve the RI Board of Directors' goal of having women make up 30% of Rotary's members by 2023. Rotary has achieved this in more than 110 countries, she said, but it has a long way to go. She pointed out that Rotaract has already achieved 50% female members.

To raise Rotary's profile, Jones plans to hold a global impact tour that will include talking with leaders about working together to address the world's most pressing challenges. "Rotary opens these doors and we need to harness our connections, to deepen these relationships and create new partnerships," Jones said. "And the best part is, this can happen at every level of leadership."

Jones closed her address by saying that although we all have dreams, acting on them is a choice we make. When an organization like Rotary dreams about big things like ending polio and creating peace, she said, it becomes our responsibility to make them happen. "You don't imagine yesterday," Jones said, "you imagine tomorrow."

Police Colonel

Police Colonel Roman Cornel Arugay was born on November 18, 1976 in Baguio City. He started his police service as a Cadet at the Philippine National Police Academy (PNPA) where he eventually earned his Bachelor of Science in Public Safety (BSPS) degree in 1997. Prior to his graduation from the PNPA, he studied in Itogon, Benguet particularly at Itogon Central School and Sacred Heart High School where he finished his elementary and secondary education, respectively.

Being one of those who graduated from the PNPA with less than 21 years of age, PCOL Arugay was temporarily assigned at the PNP National Headquarters in Camp Crame, Quezon City for almost eight months where he was designated as the Assistant Chief of Placement Section under the Recruitment and Selection Division, Directorate for Personnel and Records Management. Thereafter, he spent more than 10 years of his service with Police Regional Office 9 in Mindanao where he experienced being assigned as Company Commander of Mobile Group, Chief of Police and Staff Officer in the Regional, Provincial and City Police Offices with designation as either intelligence, investigation or operations officer. From Mindanao, he went near to his

hometown and had a brief stint with the Police Regional Office Cordillera where he was assigned as Deputy Chief of the Regional Investigation and Detective Management Division and concurrent Action Officer/Chief of the Regional Anti-Illegal Drugs Special Operations Task Group from 2008-2009. He was also assigned with the Directorate for Operations in the PNP National Headquarters as Assistant Chief of the Special Operations Division from 2009-2010 and after a year of schooling abroad, he went back to PNP duty and stayed with the PNP Training Service as Training Manager of Regional Special Training Unit 2 for less than a year before attending his Public Safety Officers Senior Officers Course in CYs 2012 to 2013.

After spending more than a year in the last/highest career course for PNP officers, he returned to duty and served for a short stint as Operations Officer of the Maritime Group based in Camp Crame before spending his one year Visayas Region Tour of Duty specifically in Police Regional Office 8 where he served as the Secretary of the Directorial Staff and Concurrent Chief of Firearms, Explosives, Security Agencies and Guards Supervision Section (FESAGSS), Regional Operations and Plans Division. In 2015, he went back to the National Headquarters and served at the Directorate for Operations as Assistant Chief of the Law Enforcement Division and thereafter, as the Executive Assistant of two Chiefs of the PNP for almost two years. From the Office of the Chief, PNP, PCOL Arugay went back to Mindanao and headed the Regional Finance Service Office of Bangsamoro Autonomous Region in Muslim Mindanao for almost two years before joining the National Capital Region Police Office as the Chief of Regional Investigation and Detective Management Division and the Chief of Police of Pasig City Police Station.

Throughout his career, PCOL Arugay has been a recipient of several awards and commendations from the PNP, AFP and other government and non-government organizations. He was once adjudged as the Staff Officer of the Year in CY 2001, Junior Officer of the Year in CY 2003 and in CY 2019, he led his unit to be awarded as the Best Regional Administrative Support Unit of the Year during the PRO-BAR's celebration of the 118th Police Service Anniversary followed by being adjudged as the PNP Finance Service's Best Regional Finance Service Office for CY 2020.

For career advancement, he also attended various trainings, seminars, schoolings, and career courses. PCOL Arugay consistently topped all the career courses that he attended such as the Public Safety Officers Basic Course (Top 10), Finance Officers Course (Top 1), Public Safety Officers Advance Course (Top 1), and Public Safety Officers Senior Officers Course (Top 1) aside from graduating at the PNPA with the Director, PNPA Kampilan Award for being the Top 8 in a Class of 166 Cadets. In 2010, he was very fortunate to be recommended by the PNP to undergo a one year schooling sponsored by the Internal Security Department of Singapore in S. Rajaratnam School of International Studies, Nanyang Technological University in Singapore where he earned a Master of Science in Strategic Studies degree and Certificate in Terrorism Studies. Despite the challenges in performing his police duties while attending law school, he was able to finish his Bachelor of Laws in four years then immediately took and passed the Bar Examinations in 2007. His professional eligibilities include Career Service Professional, NAPOLCOM Police Executive Service Eligibility and RA 1080 (Bar).

PCOL Arugay is married to Marry Rose Lim Arugay from Isabela City, Basilan Province and they were blessed with three children, namely: Raimee Rose, Russel Ray, and Roman, Jr. PCOL Arugay is the only son of retired government employees and he has three younger sisters.

***DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS
IN
BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS***

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

4. Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
5. Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
7. Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or professions;
8. Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

2. Use my vocational experience and talents to serve in Rotary

5. Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community
7. Honor the trust that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do anything that will bring dis-favor or reflect adversely on Rotary or fellow Rotarians
