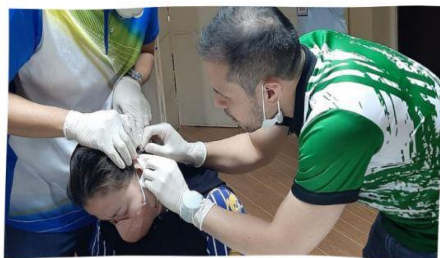

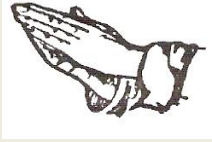

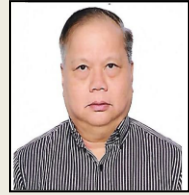

Lebanon club channels the ‘power of peace’

Like many young professionals in Lebanon, Anhal Kozhaya was ready to take his place among the latest generation to flee the country’s troubles — not war this time but an economic crisis that has driven widespread poverty, social unrest, and a collapse of public services. Then, he had second thoughts.

“Rotary is, honestly speaking, what kept me here in Lebanon,” says the 22-year-old, who works as an administrative officer at the British Embassy in Beirut. “Rotary is what kept me motivated and inspired and always wanting more for my country. If that wasn’t the case, I would have left this country a long time ago and wouldn’t have thought twice about coming back.”

Kozhaya is president of the Rotary Club of Beirut Pax Potentia, or “the power of peace” in Latin. The year-old club, which focuses on peacebuilding, has its origins in a project funded by a Rotary Foundation global grant. Another notable attribute: Its 17 members have an average age of 23, a young demographic that’s leaving Lebanon in high numbers.

Lebanon, once known as the Switzerland of the Middle East for its status as a regional banking center, has experienced waves of emigration over the past half-century. Those migrations started with the 1975-90 civil war and have accelerated during an economic crisis beginning in 2019 that has fueled triple-digit inflation, shut down the banking sector, and pushed millions into poverty.

Rotary clubs in Lebanon have stepped in to provide critical services, and the new club is furthering those efforts through a peacebuilding framework. Its young members are steeped in the principles of Positive Peace, an approach that seeks to foster the institutions, attitudes, and conditions that can allow peace to flourish.

The club's first public event was an international conference on youths as agents of peace that helped generate ideas for projects. The club, chartered in June 2023, typically meets weekly either online or in a coworking space in Beirut. Its members are so committed that even those who've had to move overseas to Italy, Malta, and Belgium to study continue to log on when they can.

In the background of the economic crisis, Lebanon also remains deeply divided along sectarian lines more than three decades after its devastating civil war. Today, 18 recognized religious sects compete for power in a fractious political system, with near-constant interference by neighboring countries.

Lebanon's challenges need to be examined in relation to Positive Peace, Kozhaya says. "You cannot talk about the environment without addressing peace," he explains. "You cannot talk about women's rights, tolerance, human rights, and community economic development without bringing in a peacebuilding perspective."

For one project, club members have visited the Maryam and Martha Community, an organization helping women and girls who have experienced gender-based violence. They raised

funds for the organization and collected donations, including food, basic hygiene products, and clothing.

In February, they hosted a workshop on the relationship between peacebuilding and theater. Among its other aims, the club is planning another peace conference, a fashion show with an emphasis on inclusion and diversity, and a scholarship fund focused on peacebuilding. Members also want to mentor high school students.

Mentorship from older Rotarians is what brought the club into being. Mona Jarudi, a member of Rotary Club of Beirut Cosmopolitan, and fellow Rotarian George Beyrouti applied for a global grant that delivered peacebuilding training to young people within their Rotary district in 2021. They worked with NewGen Peacebuilders, an education and training skills program led by Rotary Peace Fellow Patricia Shafer.

“Lebanon is a multisectorial, highly politicized country, and the youth need a way to express their opinions that are different than those of their parents or different than their surroundings,” Jarudi says. “The students themselves chose the topics they wanted to work on. And despite everything, including internet problems, electricity problems, fuel shortages, you name it, those students never missed a beat.”

Jarudi encouraged some of those NewGen alumni, including Kozhaya, to create a Rotary club. As interest grew, the students and young professionals would spend time on the weekends at Jarudi’s apartment overlooking Beirut to prepare their club for its charter.

Bayan Fakih, 21, another of those founding members, is studying for her master's in international politics in Belgium but makes sure to join the club's online events. She is surprised by how much the club has opened up her perspectives related to peace and what can be achieved at the community level. "We're not policy-makers. We're trying to promote the idea of peace from a tangible perspective to people around us, to our communities, and even to the world," she says.

For member Elise Korban, 31, the club is a place where she can mix her artistic interests with her peacebuilding passions. She works at a human rights nonprofit organization and has a background in visual arts, architecture, and social science.

Korban, who has had difficult discussions with her father about his experiences in the civil war, believes it's important for artists to help foster a collective memory about Lebanon's history. "Our history books stop after World War II," she says. "The civil war is not in the books because there are different points of view. So as artists we are responsible to give a collective memory to these events."

A shared vision of the future is important too. "I believe Rotarians are the torchbearers and they bring light to communities where they are present," Kozhaya says. "Beirut has been the subject of much violence and yet it is a phoenix that has risen from the ashes so many times. Our work with Rotary offers a message to everyone in Lebanon that we have a duty to work within a framework of peace."

Chef Claude Tayag

Chef Claude Tayag is a known Filipino painter, sculptor, handy chef, food writer, and columnist in the Philippine Star. It's been his lifelong advocacy promoting Philippine cuisine – “sa isip, sa salita, at sa gawa”.

His first book, *Food Tour*, is a collection of his essays in the Philippine Star, peppered liberally with his drawings and recipes. It was nominated the Best Philippine Culinary Travel Guide by the Madrid-based Gourmand World Cookbook Awards in 2007. He is one of six chefs who co-authored *KULINARYA – A Guidebook to Philippine Cuisine*, and also served as its food stylist.

With his wife Mary Ann Quioc, he co-authored the best-selling culinary travel guidebook *LINAMNAM – Eating One's Way Around the Philippines*. It has sold more than 25,000 copies before the pandemic.

The couple live in Balé Dutung, Angeles City, Pampanga, where diners at the by-reservation-only restaurant will find the couple serving “Chef” Claude's take on traditional Filipino favorites. Balé Dutung has been consistently voted by bloggers as one of the Philippines' top five restaurants since 2007. It has also been chosen as one of Asia's 50 Best Restaurants “The

Essence Of Asia,” a collection that celebrates authentic flavours and culinary traditions spanning across the region in 2021. HE is the man who introduced sisig to Anthony Bourdain.

Being the ninth of twelve children, Claude and his siblings learned the rudiments of cooking from their mother Adoracion Suarez Tayag. Even during his late teens, he has always been known by his family and circle of friends to be a mean “cook”, always creative and adventurous with his cooking. He earned his stripes as a “chef” when he first came out of the pantry, so to speak, and unfurled his apron to the public at Larry Cruz’s Ang Hang Restaurant in 1988, aptly called “Art Woks”, showcasing his interpretations of his paintings into edible art. In 1993, he was a featured chef at the Manila Hotel for a Chaine des Rotisseurs dinner, highlighting his interpretations of traditional Pampango cuisine. In 2001, he was invited to do a month’s cooking stint at the Prince Albert Rotisserie of the InterContinental Manila, the first Filipino chef ever to be invited, back-to-back with resident French chef Cyrille Soenen.

As our “culinary ambassador”, he represented the Philippines at the Embassy Chefs Challenge in Washington, DC, USA, in May 2016, winning the People’s Choice Award with his entry Bringhe, a fiesta rice dish, using heirloom rice from the Cordilleras and other Philippine products. He bested 25 other chefs from different countries.

In November 2018, he represented the country in the Korean-Asean Rice Festival in Seoul, Korea. Adding another feather to his many hats, he has hosted a TV show “Chasing Flavors” for the Metro Channel. Only on its second season, it was awarded

the Gawad TANGLAW (Tagapuring mga Akademisyang Aninong Gumagalaw) Jury Award 2019 for Cultural Development and Sustainability.

His most recent book “The Ultimate Filipino Adobo - Stories through the Ages,” he explores the country’s most popular, yet most controversial dish/cooking technique. Though it has some adobo recipes, it’s not a cookbook per se, but a compendium of adobo stories as told by different personalities what adobo means to them.

10 FAKE CHINESE FOOD YOU MUST AVOID

China is probably the worst culprit in the world for producing fake, toxic foods. These items look and feel just like the real thing, yet in many cases, they are toxic and could cause kidney damage or cancer.

1. **Fake Eggs** – They are made very cheaply with gelatin, artificial food coloring, water and a wax shell.
2. **Fake Rice** - They are manufacture entirely from potatoes mixed with an industrial resin.
3. **Fake Walnuts** – The walnuts are emptied, selling the nuts separately for a high price, the filling the empty shell with paper-covered cement and sealing it closed.
4. **Fake Beef** – It is manufactured ;by altering the pork by dipping it in beef extract and glazing it to make it taste and look like beef.
5. **Fake Mutton** – They are chemically altered rats, minks and fox as if they are mutton,
6. **Fake Wines** – Wine sellers simply fill posh-looking empty wine bottles with cheap fruit juice and alcohol.
7. **Fake and Adulterated Honey** – The fake honey looks like honey but is made from alum, sugar, water and

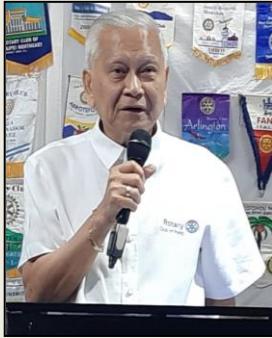

coloring. The adulterated honey is a blend of honey with sugar, beetroot or rice syrup.

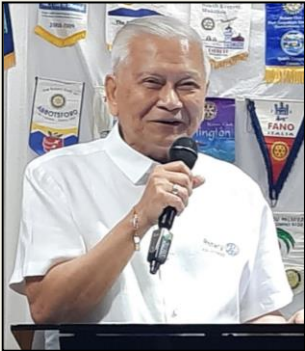
8. **Fake Green Peas** – They are made from a combination of snow peas, soy beans, green dye and metabisulfite.
9. **Fake Table Salt** - They are industrial salt so never buy salt from China.
10. **Altered Ginseng** – Made by boiling ginseng in sugar water which may contain up to 70% sugar while natural ginseng is meant to contain 20% sugar.

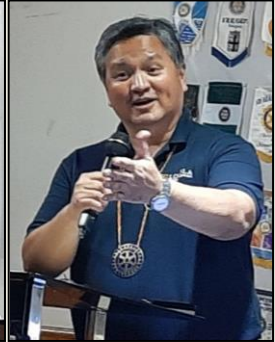

Wheat not Weeds

Nobody's Perfect . . . But Is It?

Human as we are, we are really imperfect from the start. Thus we have a saying that “nobody is perfect”, and we sometimes use this to console ourselves whenever we fail at something. But Matthew 5:48 tells us that we ought to be perfect just as our Heavenly Father is perfect. What does it mean?

Clearly, as human beings, we cannot be equal with God in terms of our being as such. But if we are going to understand the context of this passage (i.e., let's back read a little bit by reading its preceding verses), we will understand what Our Lord Jesus wanted to tell us. Actually, this is the last sentence Jesus uttered as an ending to His Message of loving your enemies as well as your friends. He used His Heavenly Father as an analogy that God the Father makes the sun shines and makes the rain fall everywhere regardless of the inhabitants. In the same way we human beings ought to do good or be virtuous with anyone regardless of who they are, be it friend or foe. If we are only good to those who are good to us while hating our enemies, what difference does it make? We simply become the enemies we hated.

So let's be good to everyone. That's what being perfect means - perfect in our relationship with one another as fellow human beings.

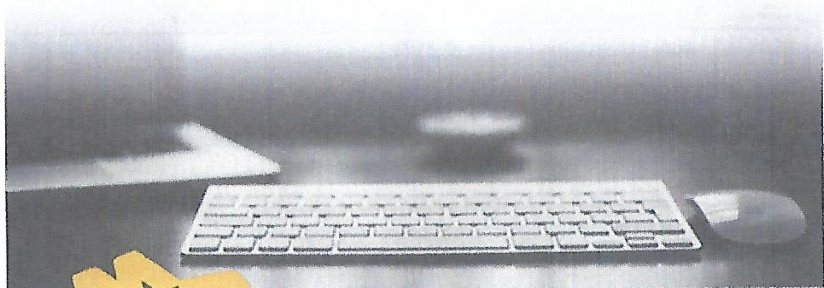
